





Conway Transfer Station

- Conway program launched Nov. 2019
- Started w/ 2 cubic yard TTT dumpster
- •10 months later, switched haulers
- Compost Cooperative hauls to Martin's Farm
- Estimated 42 tons/year
- 2010 population: 1,864
- Permit holders: 879

Conway TS, plus residential and commercial in Greenfield, Turners Falls



- Residential pickups (pails)
- Commercial pickups (toters)
- Municipal pickup- Conway
 TS (64-gal toters)
- Worker owned Co-Op providing jobs for the formerly incarcerated
- Hauls to Martin's Farm, Just Roots

Deerfield Transfer Station

- Program launched 5/19
- Started w/ 2 cubic yard dumpster (pictured)
- 6 months later, went up to 4 cubic yard
- Energy Committee vols.
 assisted program launch
- Estimated 83 tons/year
- 2010 population: 5,125
- Permit holders: 1,294
- •820 Lbs MSW/HH in 2020

Northfield Transfer Station

- Northfield program launched in 2008
- Started w/ 2 cubic yard dumpster, now 3 yard
- Estimated 63 tons/year
- 2010 population: 3,000
- Permit holders: 825
- 940 Lbs MSW/HH/year



Greenfield Transfer Station

- Program launched 2014
- 4 cubic yard dumpster
- Also has curbside pickup of MSW, recycling
- Accepts organics, recyclables from nonresidents
- Small events and businesses also use this dumpster
- 2010 population: 17,000





Orange Transfer Station

Serviced by Clear View Composting
Lockable bins, also at New Salem and Wendell TS

- Orange program launched in 2011
- Smaller program: 7 tons/year
- 2010 population: 8,000
- Permit holders: 1,157
- 900 Lbs MSW/HH/year
- Bottom picture:

Best Management Practices

- Weekly pickup
- Resident education
- Signage
- Trash can next to organics collection for plastic bags, mistakes
- Provide pails
- Report on success







Sure-Close kitchen compost collection pails

- FCSWMD coordinates large regional orders
- •FCSWMD sells to residents for \$5
- Towns buy w/ RDP funds
- •35% PCW recycled content (green)
- •Filter in lid, but lid closes tight

MassDEP's Recycling Dividends Program (RDP)

Solid Waste Management District

- MassDEP: 2 RDP points (\$) for municipal drop-off organics program.
- To earn the 2 points, the DEP requires the town to also subsidize home compost bin purchases for their residents. FCSWMD towns contribute \$25 per bin to match \$25 from the resident.
- The subsidized bin payments can come from the town's RDP funding.
- FCSWMD sells "Earth Machine" compost bins to residents and invoices towns for the subsidy.
- RDP funds can now be used to pay for the <u>entire program</u>: hauling, compost pails, compost bins, program signage, handouts... ...all at no cost to the municipality!

(Most haulers charge less than \$200/mo.)



Home composting



FCSWMD sells Earth Machines

- 4 locations
- MA state contract: \$49.50 each
- Non-compost towns \$50
- Compost towns \$25 (RDP)

YES: compost fruit, veggies, bread, grains, eggshells, coffee grounds/filters

Leaves, grass clippings, yard waste

NO: animal products - meat, bones, cheese, protein!
