

Reuse – What is it?

"The use of a product more than once in its same form for the same or similar purpose."

"Reuse involves extending the life of a product by 1) using it more than once (same or new function), 2) repairing it so it can be used longer (replacing the need for a new item), 3) sharing or renting it, or 4) selling or donating it to another party."



Types of Reuse

Adaptive Reuse—refurbishing an old/disused building for a new purpose

 A defunct hotel into a seniors housing complex or an empty big box store turned into a community center

Collaborative Consumption ("sharing economy")—
economic model based on swapping, trading, or renting

Conventional Reuse—item is used again, as-is, for the same function for which it was manufactured

Creative Reuse ("upcycling" or repurposing)—bringing a new function to unwanted materials

Furniture out of old sign posts; jewelry from scrap

Deconstruction—selectively dismantling a building into its components for reuse &/or recycling

Durables—goods designed to be used for many years &/or to replace disposables/single-use items

• Metal, glass, or plastic refillable water bottles

Freecycling—giving away unwanted, but usable, items

Online groups that help facilitate member exchanges

Materials Exchange ("waste exchange")—a service that facilitates the exchange of usable goods

• Brokering &/or an automated online interface

Reclamation ("salvage")—collecting & often reprocessing discarded materials for reuse

Old barn wood transformed into "new" flooring

Rental ("sharing economy")—items are shared &/or rented

Zip Car, Tool Banks

Refurbish—Tested & verified to function properly as-is, &/or items are repaired ensuring they function properly

Refurbished electronics

Remanufacturing—disassembling, repairing & reassembling a used product to match the performance of a new product

Toner remanufacturing

Repair—Recondition an item to be used for the same function as it was manufactured

Clothing & shoe repair

Reusable—an item is manufactured to be used over & over again, & replace disposable/single-use items

Advantages of Reuse

- Conserves energy & raw materials
- Reduces disposal needs & costs
- Returns products & materials back into the economy, benefiting society
 - Keeps resources local & supports local reuse businesses
- Textiles & other items sold or exported return monies to local/regional economies

Advantages, cont.

- Fosters job training programs & job creation
- Older items are often of better quality & appreciate in value
- Reuse, remanufacturing, repair, & refurbishment of products, parts, & materials economically benefit consumers
 - Used industrial, construction, & medical equipment
 - Automobiles, bicycles, etc.
 - By-products & chemicals

Reusing 10,000 tons of waste creates 41-216 jobs

Recycling 10,000 tons of waste creates 61-213 jobs

Incinerating or landfilling 10,000 tons of waste creates 6 jobs

Reuse Programs

Ongoing or "Permanent" Reuse Programs

- Government, nonprofit, schools, for profit
- Can be any size
- Operated by paid staff, volunteers, or a combination

- Reuse shed, swap shop, swap table
- Reuse Centers, Teacher Supply Depots
- Restores (reused building supply stores)
- Textile collections
- Community reuse guide
- Fix-It Cafes or Fix-It Clinics/Fixer Collectives
- Repair or tool libraries
- Food recovery, farmer gleaning

Examples, cont.

- Bicycle repair/reuse
- Materials exchange
- Reusable bag promotion
- Reuse education—libraries, schools, social media
- Re-craft shops
- Teacher's exchanges/school supply exchanges
- Household good exchanges
- Searchable swap databases/website

Reuse Sheds

- Reuse or swap sheds; "Take-it or Leave it" areas
- Designed for accepting a variety of items
 - Kitchen & household items, games, tools, toys, etc.
 - Or, for specific items, such as books
 - Paint & useable household cleaners, and similar products
- Provides an exchange location
- Participants bring unwanted items and/or take items at no charge

Location, Design, Budget, & Policies

- Determine the best location
- Is there an existing suitable structure?
- Or, is a building to be purchased or built?
- Funding for renovation or purchase?
- Proposed budget?
- Target materials?

Location, Design...cont.

- Policies? Items not accepted?
- Design (floor plan, shelving, etc.)
 - Available space, acceptable items, etc.
- Shelving, tables, signage, etc.
 - How to obtain, install, & label?

Maintenance & Operation

- Staffing/monitoring
- Times of operation
- Tracking system to ensure items move
- Building maintenance
- Keeping the area clean & orderly
- Publicity

Legal Questions, Liabilities...

- Liability release
 - Signage or a written form
- Sign-in?
- Determining usability of paint/hazardous
 - Ensuring proper labeling of products
 - Products in corroded containers?
 - Unacceptable HHW?

Other Issues

- HHW or Paint Reuse—precautions
 - Spill kit in or near the location
 - MSDS sheets
 - Will products that emit fumes be accepted? How about ignitable? Poisonous? Corrosive?
 - Is the shed or swap area ventilated?
 - Staff training

Other Issues, cont.

- Required recordkeeping?
 - Who will be responsible?
- Accommodations for volunteers or additional staff, such as a chair, water, etc.
- If multi-use shed—for non-hazardous & hazardous items—clearly segregate each category/type of item

- Scrap stores or teacher resource centers
- Collect & distribute unwanted industrial, commercial, & residential items
- Serve teachers, artists, nonprofit organizations, and/or public

Handcrafted artwork and gifts from local artists and makers

Vintage Village

Vintage, antique, collectible or otherwise uber-cool

Crafts

- Craft supplies at 50%-75% less than the big box craft stores
- Craft books, scrapbook supplies, rubber stamps, beads, craft paint, art supplies, kids crafts, floral supplies, more

Containers

 Variety of container options including plastic containers, cardboard boxes, gift boxes, glass jars, wood boxes, wicker baskets, tins, more

Scrap Exchange, cont.

Paper

- New paper, scrap paper, reclaimed paper—\$1/pound
- Paper types include wallpaper, paper samples, office paper, sticker paper, rolls of paper, vinyl paper, & more

Office Supplies

Paper, envelopes, manila folders, desk organizers, etc.

Sewing and Fabric

 Sewing notions, thread, zippers, yarn, ribbons and trims, fabric

AV and Electronics

• Used albums, CDs, DVDs, VHS tapes, & equipment

Building Materials Reuse


- Donations/purchase used building materials for resale
- Some offer deconstruction services
- Reduces the need for new building resources
- Reduces landfill/incinerator disposal
- Creates value-added materials for reuse
 - Helping to create job opportunities
 - Providing relatively low cost building supplies

Book Collections



Textiles

- 14.3 million tons of textiles in 2012—5.7% of MSW
- 14.4% of clothing/footwear textiles & 17.8% of other textiles (sheets/pillowcases)—recovered for export or reprocessing
- The textile recycling rate (not including reuse)
 was 15.7% in 2012 or around 2.3 million tons

Reuse Events

Reuse Events

- One-time, semi-annual, or annual
- Community partnerships
 - Holding joint events
- Can be held anytime of the year
 - Evenings & weekends

Types of Reuse Events

- Toy Exchange (great for the holidays)
- Kid's Stuff Exchange
- Community-wide garage sales or "Tail-Gate" Tag Sale
- Drive thru reuse (donation) & recycling drop-off
- Reuse Art Rally or Show
- Halloween costume exchange

Types of Reuse Events

- Prom dress/tux exchanges at schools
- Free piles
- U Price it Sales
- Durable medical equipment collection
- Combined "exchanges"—reusable plastics; usable bikes; plant pot & tray swap/collection

Initial Planning

- Type of event
- Items to be exchanged, collected for donation, and/or resold
- Anticipated size big of the event
- When & where will it be held
 - In conjunction with another recycling or community event
 - Outside or inside
 - "Rain date"

Initial Planning, cont.

- Responsibility for planning, implementing, & staffing the event
 - Will volunteers be used?
- Partnerships to implement the event
- Agencies, local reuse nonprofits, or businesses to receive collected items

Initial Planning

- Additional services needed—hauling/disposal; security; traffic control
- Estimated event costs & how to fund
- Advanced registration for participants
- Event promotion
- Event Day tasks—set-up, greeters, traffic control, monitoring, etc.
- Measure of success—quantity of material, number of participants, etc.

Planning and Coordinating

- Up to three months—depending on event, local government requirements, experience
 - Permits, insurance, etc.
- Partnerships may reduce planning time
 - Define roles, funding, & other responsibilities

Budget Items to Consider

- Promotion & outreach
- Operations
 - Labor, equipment & supplies, site rental, contracted services
 - Volunteers to help organize & staff? Sponsors or donors?
- Transportation/hauling/Recycling/Disposal
- Regional event to share costs
