



COMMUNITY

ReUse is good for people

- Engaging activities
- Empowering
- Self-sufficiency skills
- Marketable job skills
- Living wage job opportunities
- 11 employees formerly on public assistance
- Job training and skill-sharing wide variety
 - Technical, construction, customer service, retail, administrative, organizing, custodial







Above results are as of February 2016: 44 participants have been out of the program for 12 months or more.

12 months after completion, 59% of ReSET participants are employed.
















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ECONOMY

ReUse is an economic engine

- We have exceeded \$100,000 in sales in each of the last 10 quarters
- We have diverted more than 1,500 tons of waste, helping the community avoid more than \$125,000 in disposal fees
- Converted 1,500 tons of diverted "waste" into \$2.1 million in sales
- Created 25 Living Wage jobs...so far



10 people in 10 communities (100 total) moving from public assistance into living wage jobs would generate at least \$6 million* in public money (avoided costs of public assistance plus taxes paid) over 5 years.

The total economic benefit is more than \$16 million (including wages).*

*Note: This research did not factor in health expenses or benefits

ENVIRONMENT

ReUse is good for the planet

- Reduced landfill pressure
 - Toxic waste reduction
- ENERGY SAVINGS!
 - Avoided transport expense, fuel use
 - Avoided harvesting, mining, transport, processing, manufacturing of natural resources, finite and "conflict" minerals
 - Far less energy-intensive than recycling

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency asserts that by extending the lives of personal computers in the U.S. by 50%, 25 million metric tons of CO2 emissions into our atmosphere will be avoided.


